

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT







WHAT YOU TOLD US: THREE KEY PRIORITIES

Improved sense of safety for pedestrians and cyclists on multi-use trails and separated pathways

Increased access to public restrooms, food, and other amenities

Enhanced green spaces, landscaping and native plantings



CENTENNIAL PARK TODAY

WHAT YOU TOLD US: SENSE OF SAFETY FOR PEDESTRIANS AND BICYCLISTS

Respondents value the separation between bicyclists and pedestrians in the parks and requested improved navigational signage, enhanced lighting, and clearer guidance on multi-use trails.

"Separation for biking/rolling and walking is always nice, or very clear indications regarding designated space or shared space!"

"Clear signage between pedestrian/biking paths."

"Lack of lighting along both the bike and pedestrian paths has been my biggest pain point"



WHAT YOU TOLD US: INCREASED ACCESS TO AMENITIES

Respondents highlighted the importance of restrooms, food, and other public amenities in making these parks more inviting and enjoyable.



"I would like to see more benches. Places to sit and have lunch or hangout."

"Public restrooms are a must!"

"Clear Indigenous representation in design and construction and signage" and "Honoring the Coast Salish peoples."

WHAT YOU TOLD US: ENHANCED GREEN SPACES

Respondents expressed support for more native plants, more trees, and more spaces to enjoy the park.

Respondents advocated for "protected spaces for native plants, pollinator friendly plants, and trees."

"Less lawn, more native plants!"

"Please focus on green spaces and bike lanes, those make such a difference!"














