

Safety, Security, and Fare Enforcement (SaFE) Reform

"Safe, accessible, and equitable transit that is co-created to support community well-being."





Safe Ambassadors

 Appearance: bright blue polos or jackets that say "King County Metro"

Daily Work:

- Helping customers figure out where they're going, how to pay fares, and if there is a service change or delay
- Checking in with operators to see how their days are going
- Make customers feel safer

- Mount Baker Transit Center to Columbia City PCC

Behavioral Health Support

Appearance: non-uniformed, plain clothes

Daily Work:

- Connect with and build trust with customers on and off transit
- Offer services and referrals
- Offer amenity packages with snacks, water, and cold weather items
- De-escalate in place of Transit Security and Law Enforcement when able

Return of Fare Enforcement

King County Metro will ask you for proof of fare payment starting March 31, 2025

Many riders qualify for a reduced fare based on ability, age or income.



March 31st through May 30th

- Riders will be asked for proof of fare payment
- Riders will get friendly, verbal reminders if they did not pay, as well as information about reduced fares and how to apply
- Riders will be provided with information on the return to fare inspection



Starting May 31st

- First and second violations:
 - Written warnings
- Third and subsequent violations:
 - \$40 payment, reduced to \$20 if paid within 30 days
 - Enroll in a reduced fare program or register for a Youth Pass (if applicable)
 - Add money to an existing card (for ORCA)
 - Perform 2 hours of community service
 - Appeal with Fare Adjudicator
- Youth who do not have proof of payment will not face a fine or alternative resolution and will instead receive information on how to enroll in the Free Youth Transit Pass.



Safety Emphasis Coordination



Improving transit safety is a responsibility shared across Metro, King County, jurisdictions, partner agencies, and communities.

Safety Emphasis

- In key areas of our system, we're looking at options to improve safety through the following:
 - Outreach
 - Enforcement
 - Presence & Activation
 - Maintenance & Cleanliness
 - Built Environment
 - Communications
- These options include both what Metro can individually do, as well as what we can do with our jurisdictional partners

Regional Transit Safety Task Force

- The Regional Transit Safety Task Force will:
 - Align the many stakeholders
 - Provide a collaborative forum
 - Determine data-supported interventions in the short-, medium- and long-term
 - Coordinate on budget and police
 - Ensure accountability.
- Our shared goal is measurable and sustained safety improvements that will make a difference in the lives of our employees and riders.
