Introductions

Public Comment, Approval of Previous Minutes

Councilmember Pedersen's Comments

- Council asked SDOT for detailed breakdown of STM spending in 2024
 - Received around a week ago.
 - Emphasizing that there's still some funds in Emerging Needs that don't have specific line items associated with them.
- Calls out projects in South Seattle specifically
 - Safety projects for getting people to Mt Baker station
 - Could be a candidate for funds coming in from higher-than-expected sales tax revenue as part of the STM
 - o Devin Silvernail from Councilmember Morales' office has comment

- Accessible Mount Baker has been an idea for awhile
 - Current asks are an art project on the pedestrian bridge
 - Repurposing of a travel lane on Olmstead Blvd to be a walking/biking/activation space for students going to Franklin High School.
- They are eager for TAB's comment on this idea specifically
 - Would welcome comment in our STM Budget response letter specifically.

Climate Change Response Framework

- CCRF is a decision making tool for organizational and policy changes required to make meaningful progress toward our 2030 climate goals.
- Seattle Core Emissions Sources
 - Transportation is responsible for 62% of emissions
 - 2 of 3 car trips are fewer than 3 miles long
 - SDOT is responsible for 27% of Seattle's land area
- Topic Details
 - For each \$1 invested, \$8-10 return in co benefits
 - This is seen in safety, health, and neighborhood economic benefits
 - In Seattle every new transit trip eliminates 1208g of carbon dioxide, every new bike trip eliminates 366g of carbon dioxide
- The solutions
 - Example sheet
 - Bus only lanes
 - Accelerate bus-only lane installations and other travel time + reliability improvements
- Potential Outcomes
 - By 2030 (rideshare)
 - Bikes from 3 to 7%
 - Transit from 11 to 24%
 - Cars from 65 to 35%
- Where can GHG reduction be achieved?
 - Largely in electrification
- Implementation How Does the CCRF Fit In?
 - Act as "climate element" of Seattle Transportation Plan
 - Inform funding approach
 - Inform Comprehensive plan
- CCRF is reflected in the draft STP in the climate action section
- How does this relate to the STP Transit Element?
 - Mainly through the frequent transit network.
- Questions
 - Talking about electrification, how "green" is the grid that we're drawing from?
 - The grid is mostly clean and there is more detail on how they gain access is found in the CCRF?
 - o If bus only lanes are a "high cost" endeavor, what is a low cost?

- These categories were run through the mayor's office
- Could be factoring in scale
- As an example, new lanes vs refreshing old ones. New lanes cost much more. In general, bus lanes aren't just bus lanes, it's a whole bus corridor that could include pedestrian improvements, crosswalks, etc.
