1. Regular Business

- SWAC Co-Chair, Dirk Wassink called the meeting to order at 5:35 PM.
- Members and guests introduced themselves. Prompted by the SWAC chair, they each shared their name and the city they are from.
- Notes for March and May were approved by members in attendance
- 8/5 will be the last meeting for Alan Garvey and Kit Gardner as SWAC members

2. Solid Waste LOB Updates

SWLOB COVID Program Updates

- The city of Seattle continues to follow the state and county directives.
- Midway landfill currently working with SDOT to remove encase from the ROW which will eventually be transported to Oregon for final disposal
- 2020 Bag Ban report was submitted to Council on 7/17/20
- SPU is actively engaged in packaging policy committee

Comp Plan & Public Comment Update

Successfully received approval to move forward with the Comp Plan

3. SPU Solid Waste COVID-19 Snapshot

The Solid Waste Planning & Program Management staff gave updates on their sections and how are they are moving forward through COVID-19:

Contract Services & Facility Updates

- City moved into an Incident Command mode because of COVID. For SW, it meant dealing with staffing issues
- Collection contractors did not lose many staff. Commercial collection went down significantly as residential waste increased with more people being at home
- There was a challenge at the transfer stations with many staff being out with the risk of being exposed to COVID
- Transfer stations reopened to 7 days/week in June
- o SPU is looking to keep its programs in place with the revenue staying consistent

CHOP/CHAZ related work

- Around 44 containers were removed from the CHOP/CHAZ area due to protests. Public area dumpsters were put in place of them and the customers appreciated that.
- SPU setup a regular service time by 5:30 a.m. to clear the area for collections. SPU was able to do this by staying in communication with the protestors.
- o Port-o-Potty's were added in the CHOP and CHAZ

Outreach shift and future planning

- Unable to meet with people in person like usual.
- Made a conscious effort not to burden people with too much Solid Waste Information, in the beginning
- Working closely with outreach staff from hauler and consultants to try various modes of distanced outreach
- Participating in online webinars, updating social media, zoom meetings and video calls
- Currently looking into distanced visits
- This has also been an opportunity to look for things that we can control and do remotely
- SPU will try its best to stay connected to customers and respond to their needs & concerns

Consultants and subcontractors

- Finding ways to approach contracts with an equity lens
- Work right now consists of socially distanced outreach work and becoming more creative in communicating with residents
- Assisting businesses and restaurants with outdoor areas

Packaging, Bags & Commercial Outreach

- Outreach will not include in-person events, but virtual
- Recology: No contact audits & 'Streeteries'
- Waste Management (WM) has developed direct mail postcards with Relaunch Green info and WM Re-Think Waste & Recovery Grant info

Community Grants & Love Food, Stop Waste

- Great time to get messaging out with so many people at home and looking to prepare their own meals
- Working to pull different networks together in order to get the messaging out about how to make your groceries stretch longer and reduce trips to the grocery stores
- Grant program is still moving along and selected 9 different grant recipients for this year.

Likely to extend some grant projects past this year due to COVID

4. Annual Waste Prevention and Recycling Report Overview

Stephanie Schwenger provided an overview of the 2019 Waste Prevention & Recycling Report.

- Overall waste generation and recycling remain flat despite a decade of staggering population growth
- o A booming population + flat waste generation = declining daily per capita waste generation
- o Generation decreased slightly, as did the recycling rate
- Next steps:
 - o Finalize C&D recycling rate
 - Address issues with commercial recycling
 - o Calculate overall recycling
 - Complete draft report for SWAC review
