1. Regular Business

- SWAC Co-Chair, Dirk Wassink called the meeting to order at 5:30 PM.
- Members and guests introduced themselves. Prompted by the SWAC chair, they each shared their name and their ideal weather temperature.
- May meeting minutes were approved by SWAC members in attendance.

2. Solid Waste LOB Updates

Socorro Medina led a presentation on how to improve the quality of the traditional recyclables

- Surveys
 - The Commercial Customer Satisfaction Survey will start being fielded on 6/4.
 Reminder emails will be sent to SPU's contact list on 6/11, and follow-up calls inlanguage will be targeted to minority businesses if there is a low response rate.
 - The survey will run through 6/25 and a summary should be available around 7/9
 - This survey is a requirement of our Solid Waste Collection Contract, to occur everyother-year – asked for methodology for selection of Commercial customers being surveyed
 - Can be received from Angela/Cascadia
- Reuse Systems Research
 - UW Evans School Research Team has written a great report on Reuse Systems and next steps for Seattle to reduce single-use plastics. It includes criteria that SPU can use evaluation and rank systems and possibly use by the broader reuse community.

- This will be available soon for those outside SPU to access.
- Director's Rule re: Single-use Packaging
 - SPU currently has the proposed revisions to Director's Rule SW-500, Temporary
 Exceptions to Food Service Ware and Packaging Products, out for public review and comment
 - The Director's Rule is used to provide temporary waivers from the requirement that all single-use, food-service ware be either compostable or recyclable for select products, and these waivers expire annually if not renewed
- This revision renews for an additional year the waivers that expire on June 30, 2021. In addition:
 - o Requires compliance with state laws passed in 2020 and 2021.
 - Food-service businesses that use items listed under Temporary Waivers must post a notice and identify items as non-compostable and non-recyclable.

 - Food Rescue 10-Day Count at Grocery Stores Pilot
 - Recently conducted a 10-day food composition study at the loading docks of numerous Safeway and PCC grocery stores in Seattle. The goal is to gather data to help with future assistance and allocation of resources. Our hope is to decrease food going to garbage and edible food going to compost, as well as decrease contamination from packaging and identify unaccounted waste. During the pilot, the consultant:
 - Measured and graded quality of surplus food being donated.
 - Quantified contamination across composting, recycling, and waste streams.
 - Assessed stores' dockside operations and interviewed staff for areas of improvement.
 - Quantified costs of storage, transportation, and labor.
 - The participating grocery stores want to understand how to improve their food donation operations for better community outcomes. The participating food banks and meal programs (12 of them) that collect the food from the grocery stores, represent a diverse group of clients (geographically, culturally, demographically, housed/unhoused) and hopefully, will benefit from improved donation programs.
 - 2021 Bag Ban Report
 - The report is completed and will be transmitted to Council by 7/1

3. Bag Ban & Report Update

- Statewide ban delayed by proclamation
 - Senate Concurrent Resolution 8402
 - o Effective until end of COVID-19 State of Emergency
 - 6 months of outreach and tiered warnings over 6 months once implemented before any enforcement through fines. Goal is to gain compliance through process, not enforce through fines.
- Review of Law

- Busy over the last month developing our 2022 Budget Proposal, which will be reviewed and finalized by E-team, before sending to the MO for review and approval.
- Prohibits single use plastic carryout bags
- Requires 8 cent charge for all retail provided bags
- Requires 40% post-consumer recycled content or non-wood renewable fiber in large paper bags
- Requires 20% post-consumer content in 2.25 mil plastic bags
- Applies to restaurants, farmers markets, retail stores, grocers, convenience stores, etc.
- Not Included in the Ban
 - Bags used in store for bulk items
 - Green or brown compostable bags used in store*
 - Newspaper/dry cleaning/door hanger bags
 - Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags (garbage, pet waste)
 - Bags used to wrap items for sanitation or safety purposes
- Outreach Toolkit
 - Staff is working on improving MF and UDP customer access to special item collection currently and will be reviewing other potential SPU enhancements later in year
 - Designed with SPU and stakeholder input
 - Available in 17 languages
 - o Downloadable and customizable
- SPU Bag Ban Outreach Plan
 - Direct mail
 - Website
 - Site visits
 - Free outreach materials
 - Ecology's enforcement strategy
- Potential to Expand Outreach for Recent Legislation
 - o SHB 1145
 - Website
 - Non-wood renewable fiber
 - Amends bag ban law
 - o **5022**
 - Bans certain expanded polystyrene products
 - Customer request for food service-ware
