


### **Continued Transit Growth in Seattle**



- Seattle continues to grow
  - Jobs up 19% since 2010
  - Population up 20% since 2010
  - Home prices up 85% since 2012
- Transit mode share up to 48% in 2017

### Where do STBD dollars go?


For every dollar collected, STBD spends \$0.91 directly on improving transit service and access in Seattle






## Adding Trips Across the City






## **Expansion of 10-Minute Network**

## **Frequent Transit Network**



Routes on the Frequent Transit Network have at least 30-minute or better service, 18 hours a day, seven days a week




Urban Villages are served by one or more frequent routes, defined as 15-minutes or better on weekdays from 6AM – 7PM



Households have 10-minute or better service within a 10-minute walk of their home




## Ridership

#### \*Trailhead Direct service only operates on weekends and select holidays.


#### Seattle RapidRide Ridership June 2015 - June 2018






## On-Time Performance






### **Youth ORCA**

#### **Youth ORCA Program Performance** 2016 - 2018

- 3,000 cards
   distributed in 2017-18
   school year
  - 1,614 high school
  - 386 middle school
- \$776,000 saved
- 513,000 trips take





## **ORCA Opportunity**

- Announced February 2018
- Provides free ORCA card to all Seattle Public Schools high school students for 12 months
  - New card to 10,200 high school students, most of whom have never received an ORCA card
  - Expanded summer card coverage to 6,800 high school students, all of whom have previously received a 10-month ORCA card from Seattle Public Schools
  - Provide ORCA cards to 300 Seattle Promise participants, which provides free tuition to graduates of Seattle Public Schools at the Seattle Colleges
- Continue to provide 500 income-eligible SPS middle school student cards



### Service Investments Goals



#### **Implement Frequent Transit** Network

- Improve service on priority corridors
- Provide 72% of households with a 10-min walk to 10-min service



- Improve Access for Historically
   Disadvantaged Populations
   Address findings of Racial Equity Analysis
   Support Transportation Equity Program



#### **Align Transportation and Land Use Goals**

- Match investments to increased density
- Address overcrowding



#### **Improve Connections Across the** City

- Add service to east-west connections
- Improve 24-hour service network



## Aligning Capital Investments with Service

- Improve service on priority corridors
  - Future Transit + Multimodal Corridors
  - Projects in One Center City Near Term Action Plan
  - Improve existing high-investments corridors
  - Speed & Reliability projects
- Improve access for historically disadvantaged populations
  - Bus Zone Upgrades
  - Real-Time Information




## Proposed Future Transit + Multimodal Corridors

- Transit Lanes
  - Rainier Ave Queue Jump and Transit Lane Refresh
  - SLU Transit Lane Expansion (Blanchard/ Lenora)
  - 24th Ave E Bus Lane
  - Leary Way Bus Lane
  - Westlake Ave Transit Lane Expansion
  - Holman Rd/ 15th Ave NW Bus Lane
- Transit Signals and Striping
  - 15th Ave NE Bus Lane and Signal Timing
  - North 45th/46th St Signal and Lane Modifications





- Bus Layover Bays




# Proposed Transit Speed & Reliability

- 15th Ave W Transit Lane & Zone Improvements




## Proposed Passenger Amenities

- Bus Zone Enhancements/Upgrades
  - Westlake & 9th Avenue (southbound)
  - Lenora (b/w 4th & 5th)
  - 23rd Ave (b/w Rainier and Madison)
  - Fremont Av & N 34th St
  - 25th Ave & Walker
  - Lake City Way & NE 125th St (northbound)
  - Phinney Ave N & N 46th St
  - Rt 27 Rear Door Pads
- Real Time Information
  - Route 36
  - Lake City Way




# **Objectives of STBD Capital Investments**

- Keep buses moving for faster and more reliable service
  - Transit lanes, queue jumps, transit signal priority, etc
  - Support future RapidRide Lines
- Invest in capital improvements related to passenger amenities
  - Rider amenities such as zone improvements and all-door boarding
- Continue to invest in transit despite fleet and operator limitations
- Improvements complete by end of 2020



## First Mile/ Last Mile Connections

- King County Metro Ride2 service
  - First program launches in Eastgate on 10/23 (map)
- SDOT working with Metro to improve mobility for Period of Maximum Constraint and expand access to high capacity transit
