Soil needs: prefers moist but well drained, yet adaptable

Min. planting strip width: 12 ft.

- · Disease and pest resistant Foliage is aromatic in warm weather or when
- crushed Works well in groupings
- for privacy





Min. planting strip

- Disease and pest resistant • Narrow, coarsely toothed, shiny green leaves resemble chestnut leaves
- Sweet acorn palatable to people and animals

Review the minimum planting strip width requirements before selecting your tree.

Under power lines?

Select one of the power line approved trees.

Apply for trees online starting on **July 1st** at www.seattle.gov/trees/planting-and-care/ trees-for-neighborhoods* Submit your application by July 29th

Attend a workshop to learn how to plant and care for them. We deliver the trees to you.

Plant your trees! Stay connected with Trees for Seattle and receive tips and tree care reminders to keep your trees healthy.
