








Trees for Seattle's Top 5



We support residents in Tree Care skills; increasing the health of Seattle's forest.


We engage Seattleites in stewardship of Seattle's forest.

Seattle's Forest in 2022



- 28.1% canopy cover in 2021
- About 70% located on residential land
- Canopy is not equitably distributed

Trees for Neighborhoods

- Plant 1000 free trees with residents
 - 250+ street trees
 - 300 power-line approved trees funded by Seattle City Light
- Provide tree and site selection assistance
- Street tree permit assistance
- Supply watering bags & mulch

... improves the health of Seattle's forest by partnering with community-based organizations to care for trees while helping residents gain hands-on experience and centering equity.











Insights from the toolkit process:

- Trees require investment this creates barriers.
- Prioritize school-based canopy equity and cooling.
- Some residential right of way tree maintenance falls on residents and is a barrier to health of sites.







Insights from the toolkit process:



- There is a desire for job pathways and paid stewardship opportunities; this will reduce barriers.
- There is a desire for community participation in Trees for Seattle at all scales – not just volunteer stewardship

COMMUNITY OWNERSHIP


Communities best understand their community and should be able to lead.

Empower communitybased organizations to lead behavior change work, providing support as requested.






External Communication Actions:

- Trees for Seattle Communication Plan







Tree Care Actions:

- Focus on tree appreciation as a "way-in" to care and stewardship
- Host events in priority neighborhoods connect appreciation to volunteer stewardship
- Co-develop tree appreciation events with priority communities
- Add mulch giveaways in priority neighborhoods







Volunteer Stewardship Actions:

- Support SPU asset lands in priority neighborhoods
- Support new SDOT sites in priority neighborhoods
- Community-requested events







Support Seattle Public Schools to Grow Trees

Volunteer support to:

- Plant new trees support
- Mulch, water, and care for trees
- Protect and prune as needed



Current Trees for Neighborhoods Actions

- Created a model for full-delivery of all trees for all residents
- Offered more planting assistance
- Provided additional support in highheat neighborhoods
 - Guidance and site visit support piloted in 2022



Future Trees for Seattle ideas

- Guarantee trees for High Heat/Low Canopy Neighborhoods
- Provide additional support in high-heat neighborhoods to all participants
 - Site visits, planting demonstrations
 - Watering support and maintenance
- Neighborhood Steward Program









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
