Introduction

The Public Art Program of the Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs seeks to enrich the lives of Seattle's residents by providing diverse public art experiences.

Municipal Art Plan

The Municipal Art Plan (MAP) describes the status of continuing public art projects and establishes budgets for new public art projects for the Public Art Program of the Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs. The Seattle Municipal Code requires that one percent of certain city capital improvement program funds from select city departments be placed in the Municipal Art Fund for the purchase and commissioning of artworks. The Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs manages the fund and the program and prepares, adopts and amends the annual MAP. Funding sources for 1% for Art projects include voter-approved levies (e.g., Fire Facilities and Emergency Response Levy, Bridging the Gap), eligible capital improvement project revenues, transferred construction funds and special funds such as grants. In late December 2005, a Washington State Court of Appeals ruling modified a 2004 lower court ruling on the use of Seattle City Light funds, and subsequently Seattle Public Utilities funds, as related to participation in the 1% for Art program. Based on the Court of Appeals' ruling, both Seattle City Light and Seattle Public Utilities will continue to be mandated to participate in the 1% for Art Program, provided that the funds be spent on artwork projects that had a "sufficiently close nexus" to the mission and work of the utilities. The Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs developed a policy that outlines appropriate applications of the utilities' 1% for Art funds.

Projects generated through the MAP also have the potential to leverage investment by other government entities, as well as private donors, foundations and community groups. In recent years, projects initiated by the Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs have utilized non-1% for Art funds from city departments, Metro King County and the Port of Seattle, as well as the Library Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts.

The Public Art Program director and staff participate in city planning efforts and meet frequently with representatives from each of the city departments throughout the year to discuss capital improvement plans and how the Public Art Program can reinforce the city's work. Public art staff reviews Capital Improvement Plans with departmental staff to identify appropriate locations of public art and prioritize projects that will meet the goals of the city and the department. Artworks are related to the capital improvement projects or the ongoing work of the department and must be located in places that are publicly accessible, usually on city-owned property. Once the work with city departments is completed, funding allocations and recommendations are presented to the Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC), a standing committee of the Seattle Arts Commission that gives advisory input to staff to fine tune final recommendations for the annual MAP. Following PAAC review, the plan goes to the full Arts Commission for review and then is submitted to the Department of Finance and the Mayor for final approval. Throughout the year, changes to the City's Capital Improvement Program occur. These changes may alter the scope and budget of projects based on changes in funding and/or policy priorities. Furthermore, public art program goals and priorities may change over the course of the year, affecting the focus of some of the projects. Such adjustments to funding are identified and reflected in the MAP in the subsequent year.

Artist and Artwork Selection

The Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs has established procedures for artist and artwork selection that closely mirror other City of Seattle contracting procedures. Most artist commissions and artwork purchases are conducted on a competitive basis. At least half of the funds must be allocated to artists living in the Pacific Northwest. The competitive methods used for artist and artwork selections include "open calls," "invitational calls," "rosters," and "direct selection" of artists. Panels of qualified arts professionals, community members, design team members and city department representatives review the applications of all competitors.

Open calls for artists are requests for qualifications that are advertised regionally or nationally. Invitational calls solicit qualifications or proposals from artists with specific areas of focus who have been nominated by an expert panel with knowledge in the pertinent area. Artist rosters are formulated through a publicly

advertised competition and a subsequent review of qualifications. Direct selection of artist or artworks, which is rarely used, is confined to purchases or commissions where a very specific type of art is purchased (e.g., a totem pole), a certain expertise is needed or project continuity may be required. At the conclusion of the artist-selection process, artists who are recommended by the selection panel can be awarded a contract or artworks can be purchased.

MAP Overview

The first table on page 5 outlines the funding sources and appropriations for 2008. The second table lists active and upcoming 2008 projects and shows current-year allocations to those projects. Projects fully funded by non-1% for Art funds are shown in the body of the MAP but not in the tables.

The body of the MAP lists all ongoing projects and new projects anticipated to begin this funding year, the projects are grouped according to the funding source department. Each project lists the selection method for the artist and geographical eligibility of applicants. If the project is underway, the commissioned artist is listed. The funding table indicates, where applicable, prior years' allocations, allocation of 2008 funds, current project total and a total estimated project cost. The figures shown in the columns represent, as follows:

Prior Allocations

This column shows all funding that has been allocated to the project prior to 2008. It is not a life-to-date expenditure figure.

2008 Allocation

The figure in this column indicates the amount of 2008 Adopted Budget 1% for Art funds allocated to the project.

Current Project Total

This column, which is not shown on all tables, shows current funding amount through 2008. It is anticipated that a few projects may continue to receive additional allocations in future years, in which case the estimated project total column (see below) will reflect projected total funding for the project.

Estimated Project Total

This column shows the total anticipated funding for the project. If the project does not show the additional column "Current Project Total," the estimated project total includes all funds expected to be allocated to the project.

Utility Budgets

In 2007, the Public Art Program received revenue from retroactive 1% for Art funds from Seattle City Light and Seattle Public Utilities for years 2004, 2005 and 2006. The Public Art Program did not collect these funds during the period of Okeson lawsuit. The appropriation for these revenues has been divided over three years, \$750,000 in 2007, \$750,000 in 2008 and \$160,375 in 2009.

Other Activities

The Municipal Art Plan is intended to provide a description of public art projects that are supported with 1% for Art funds (and/or by separate memorandum of agreement with departments). However, there are additional activities that the Public Art Program performs that are funded with sources other than 1% for Art and which are not included in this document. In addition to the projects described here, the Public Art Program manages the city's Portable Works collections, rotating, repairing and stewarding artworks that are displayed on the walls of city facilities. The program provides collection management services with funds received from the utilities and the Department of Finance. The Public Art Program also has an extensive conservation program to repair and restore damaged artworks and to provide ongoing maintenance and stewardship of both the permanent and portable artworks in the city's collections; this work is funded by allocations from the Cumulative Reserve Subfund.

With the conclusion of the Okeson lawsuit, Seattle City Light is participating again in the 1% for Art Program. In 2007, Arts received revenue from 2004, 2005, and 2006, in addition to 2007 funds. The artwork projects to which the 1% for Art funds are allocated must have a "sufficiently close nexus" to Seattle City Light's primary mission and purpose.

An annual on-going project that is the continuation of a project begun in 2003, Union Street Electric gallery provides a location for the changing exhibition of temporary mesh banners, 14' high x 100' long, on a large concrete wall at this City Light facility in downtown Seattle. The artists provide a design and work with Rainier Industries, who produces the banners. This project is open to Seattle artists, and two artists will be selected each year based on commissioned proposals. Each artwork will be displayed for approximately six months. The addition of the banner to a large concrete wall enhances the workplace for City Light employees based out of this facility. Should construction by the adjacent property owner alter views of this wall, an alternative option at the site will be investigated.

In 2007, Seattle City Light started remodeling the elevator entrances on seven floors the utility occupies in the Seattle Municipal Tower. Each elevator lobby is approximately 8.5 feet high by 40 feet long and leads to the office spaces for the electric utility. Ten nominators, curators and arts administrators, from five regions around the country nominated artists who were invited to submit qualifications. Fourteen artists were commissioned to produce proposals, seven received commissions to realize their artwork on one of seven elevator lobby sites. These commissions will enhance the workplace for the employees of Seattle City Light.

The artwork uses light to cast an image on a wall and will enhance the conference room for City Light employees. Funds allocated in 2008 will provide conditions in the room to allow the artwork to be shown to its best advantage.

Union Street Electric Gallery Reuse Project

As the vinyl murals from the Union Electric Street Gallery are removed at the end of their temporary, six month display, they will be repurposed into tote bags to be given to Seattle City Light employees as recognition tokens. This reuse keeps the artworks out of the landfills and provides a longer life for the artwork. Each tote bag will have a label that shows the whole banner and credits the artists.

Sited Artwork Projects

Seattle City Light's Portable Works collection is sizeable and significant but demand for artworks is high. Unlike the collection for Seattle Public Utilities, City Light's collection has not been recently updated. An opportunity exists to expand the collection with fresh artworks. A commissioning project may provide opportunities for mentoring of emerging artists.

This project could focus on artists exploring new ideas, new sustainable media, sustainability and green issues, both permanent and temporary, that can be located at City Light facilities or that can address issues of conservation related to Seattle City Light's mission at other locations.

Seattle Public Utilities

Seattle Public Utilities 1% for Arts funds come from three sources: Water, Drainage and Wastewater, and Solid Waste. During the period of the Okeson lawsuit, against Seattle City Light, collection of 1% for Art funds from SPU were suspended, but SPU is now participating again in the 1% for Art Program. In 2007, Arts received revenue from 2004, 2005, and 2006, in addition to 2007 funds. The budget authority was divided between 2007 and 2008. The artwork projects to which the 1% for Art funds are allocated must have a "sufficiently close nexus" to Seattle Public Utilities' primary mission and purpose.

Retroactive 2004-2006 1% for Art funds have been reduced by \$95,000, which was advanced in 2006 and reflected in the 2006 Amendment to the Municipal Art Plan. One project completed in 2006 is described here. In 2005, Arts and SPU executed an MOA that included expenditure carryover, previously allocated 1% for Art funds, as well as funds that were transferred to Arts through this agreement. These funds may be reflected in "prior" column. The retroactive 1% for Art payments to Arts have been reduced by any MOA funds that Arts received. Additionally, an MOA will be executed to transfer funds ("advance") to be charged against future Solid Waste 1% for Art funds for the Recycling and Waste Disposal Artist in Residence.

As part of its efforts to replace housing at High Point, Seattle Housing Authority is working with Seattle Public Utilities to integrate a natural drainage system. Artist Bruce Myers worked with the project designers, SvR and Nakano Landscape Architects to create functional elements, such as grates for water run-off and a free-standing sculpture that explains natural drainage functions on the site. Reallocation of contingency funds accommodates the attenuated construction timeframe of the housing project and the artist's need to follow the construction timeline.

Thornton Creek Water Quality Channel (Urban Creek Revelations)

Working with DPD, artist Benson Shaw developed an art plan for Northgate that addressed opportunities in the Thornton Creek watershed area, including a proposal related to revealing SPU's creek restoration efforts. The artist is creating a series of "vignettes" at key points along the Thornton Creek Water Quality Channel, an SPU drainage facility, that demonstrate for the viewer the ideas of falling, flowing and retained water. The artist has been commissioned to create artworks at two of three proposed locations; the proposal for the third location will be studied for feasibility once the detention channel is complete.

This project received MOA funds in 2005, and the allocation was increased by project management costs that were expended and recorded separately through the MOA. Any funds that remain at project completion will be reprogrammed

Natural Drainage Project

This project received reallocations from a completed SPU drainage project. SPU proposes to install a natural drainage system near new development on Yale Avenue North across from Cascade Park. The planted swale area along the several-block long drainage system will provide an opportunity for art on SPU property. The artwork will enhance the viewer's understanding of SPU's mission and techniques for natural drainage.

Initial funds are for selection. This project did not proceed in 2007. Additional funds will be added in 2009 if a project is undertaken.

South Park Drainage Residency

Initial funds are allocated for selection and design that are slated for fall 2008. Artists with particular experience or from the neighborhood will be invited to apply.

SPU's South Park Pump Station project will install a storm water pump station on the south shore of the Duwamish River in the South Park neighborhood. The pump station will be the City's first storm water pump station and will address some of the existing flooding problems in the area and provide a framework for constructing other flooding and water quality improvements in the future. The site-specific artwork will be associated with the construction of the pump station and any related appurtenances. The artwork will enhance the work place for SPU employees and will provide insight into natural storm water drainage to other passersby in the vicinity. Another location for artwork is at Trenton Street. The artist residency will investigate and identify other opportunities to create drainage related artworks in the South Park neighborhood between these two anchor sites. These artworks will promote and elucidate Seattle Public Utilities' mission of providing drainage services.

The Sand Point Calibration Baseline is an SPU facility used by all SPU divisions to calibrate surveying equipment. The baseline is a series of six locations along a one-kilometer long cleared pathway at Sand Point/Magnusson Park. This artwork by Perri Lynch placed a series of standing stone markers, sandblasted with images relating to surveying history and drilled through with holes, at points along the baseline. When the observer peers though the stones, the circular drill holes create a framed perspective of the trees, grasses, sky and surrounding natural elements of the park environment. This artwork enhances the calibration experience for SPU's surveyors, as well educates passersby to one of the services provided by SPU to the surveying community. One marker remains to be installed in conjunction with park construction.

This project received MOA funds in 2005, and the allocation was increased by project management costs that were expended and recorded separately through the MOA. Any funds that remain at project completion will be reprogrammed.
