# **Civic Engagement or Social Practice? Definition and Elements**

An aspect of the Civic Poet & Poet Laureate role as ambassador is through 'civic engagement or social practice.' This differs from a solo studio practice. **What does this look like and how does it take shape and unfold?** 

- Approach, priorities, and networks drive the project and are uniquely different for each poet or partner(s).
- Projects can include a mix of disciplines, take place in traditional or non-traditional venues, generate a product (such as a publication or artwork), a convening or conversation, a report, a public event, or other.
- **Opportunities can inform, promote, enhance, or advance** an issue or agenda from a range of topics or areas like—but not limited to—education, environment, equity, food access, health, political, social, or other.
- Ventures can be short or long-term, simple, or complex and can be a one-time or extended opportunity with a full range of budget sizes.
- **Potential partners** can include—but are not limited to—community/social/health service non-profits, corporations and small businesses, K-12 or higher educational institutions, neighborhood associations, government agencies (city, county or state), or other.
- The work involves managing people, project, and paperwork. Recommended skill set includes—but not limited to—collaboration, communication, organization, negotiation, facilitation, project and partnership development, shared leadership, presentation, and evaluation.
- Funding agency may provide a range of support to leading poet: promotions, web site, social media, travel stipend, intern assistance, and more. Commission funds can be spent on artist fees, supplies/materials, or other expenses. Poet determines which ventures will be 'donated time' and which are paid.
