ACCOUNTABILITY ORDINANCE (12-cv-01282) - 2 Seattle's accountability system and passes the "three levels of scrutiny" identified by the Court<sup>2</sup> in that it moves the City toward policing (1) that complies with the Constitution; (2) that allows police to be effective; and (3) that the people of the community can have confidence in.

The CPC asks that the Court enter an order opening the door to full implementation as soon as possible.<sup>3</sup> The current accountability system—preordinance—is under significant stress. The OPA auditor position has been filled by an interim officeholder with a limited mandate since last October. The OPA director has recently announced his resignation. And the OPA Review Board has all but ceased to exist. The City is taking preparatory steps to fill the OPA Director, Inspector General, and new CPC positions. For these reasons, there is an urgency associated with implementation of the ordinance.

## II. CONCLUSION

The success of reform is never guaranteed, but this ordinance is an opportunity to create lasting, positive change. The Community Police Commission, therefore, respectfully asks the Court to adopt the recommendations of the Commission as stated herein.
