#### **RESIDENTS RATE PRIORITIES FOR THE 2015-15 CITY BUDGET**

In May, Seattle City Councilmembers visited Seattle neighborhoods to ask local residents about their city spending priorities. The four Community Budget Workshops were held in the Columbia City, Central District, University District, and Delridge neighborhoods on May 6, 7, 8, and 14 respectively.

The workshops drew roughly 70 attendees, many of whom rated city budget priorities through a questionnaire. At the first two workshops, residents were asked to rate the priority of a full list of city departments and services ranging human services and housing to the arts and police. The third workshop questionnaire covered parks, libraries, arts, and neighborhoods. The final workshop featured a questionnaire about police, fire department services, and civil rights. Attendees at all workshops were also asked to share the two most important funding needs for their neighborhoods.

Councilmember Nick Licata, who chairs the City Council Budget Committee, thanks attendees for sharing their priorities for the 2015-16 City Budget. Responses to the questionnaires are summarized below.
