ORDINANCES

New Laws Passed

Our collective priorities ran the gamut from ambitious to lofty, humble to pragmatic. We're proud of our overarching accomplishments, and of our dedication to furthering public safety, human services, housing and (early) education.

- Implemented **Secure Scheduling**, requiring that certain retail and food service employees receive their work schedules 2 weeks in advance
- Sought to **prevent traffic fatalities by lowering speed limits** on Seattle roads ("20 is Plenty")
- Banned Gay Conversion Therapy in Seattle
- Prohibited discrimination against tenants based on their source of income; required landlords accept the first qualified applicant
- Set the stage for more affordable residential housing development
- Approved a Freight Master
  Plan to foster truck mobility
  and the delivery of goods
- Prohibited rent increases in buildings with uninhabitable conditions

- Dedicated Social Justice
  Funds to provide
  alternatives to youth

- Supported business revitalization and development in Ballard and the West Seattle Junction
- Revamped Seattle's Comprehensive Plan, allowing for more equitable development citywide
- Updated and adopted Transit Master Plan to advance bus rapid transit and Sound Transit 3 investments
- Funded 72 new SPD officers, seeking to improve response times
- Authorized the voterapproved Housing Levy to create more low-income housing

- Approved the **All Gender Restroom Ordinance**, making single occupant restrooms available to any person, regardless of sex or gender identity
- Required periodic building energy tune-ups every 5 years on large buildings
- Designated Washington Hall, Mt Baker Presbyterian Church, Volunteer Park, and University Heights Center as historic landmarks
- Authorized new programming and activation in Westlake and Occidental Parks
- Expanded access to Utility Discount Program for more people with low-incomes
- Enhanced staffing to provide better in-district Council outreach

## RESOLUTIONS

The Will of the Council

- Aspired to 30% Electric Vehicle Use in Seattle by 2030
- Called for individualized tenant assessment for applicants with criminal history
- Supported **six communityinitiated projects** for the Central Area, the Chinatown/ International District and South Seattle to mitigate displacement and increase access to opportunity
