2022 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)

I. Introduction

The City of Seattle Human Services Department (HSD) is pleased to issue its 2022 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) related to the following investments:

- 1. Farm to Table Support Services**
- 2. Youth and Young Adult Behavioral Health**
- 3. Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Survivor Services**
- 4. Domestic Violence Intervention Project (DVIP) Services**

This notice provides an overview of HSD's impending funding opportunities for 2022 with a brief description of the service areas for each opportunity, anticipated funding amounts, release dates, and contract start dates. Once finalized, HSD will issue detailed funding opportunities for each investment.

HSD invests in services that connect people with resources and solutions in times of need so we can all live, learn, work, and take part in strong, healthy communities. Guided by HSD's Theory of Change, funding opportunities will include both population level and racial disparity data and will outline the desired results of the investment. In 2022, HSD will include new questions focused on a) language access for people who are deaf or hard of hearing and b) program and service accessibility for individuals for whom English is a second language.

HSD emphasizes the importance of equity by engaging with communities who have been disproportionately impacted by systems of oppression and/or are underserved, such as communities of color, limited English speakers, LGBTQ, persons with disabilities, seniors, and low-income individuals and families. HSD recognizes reducing racial and social disparities may require organizations to collaborate and develop a shared strategy to serve our diverse population. HSD is particularly interested in partnerships that are co-designed and formalized through subcontract arrangements. Partnerships should reflect an equitable division of funding, a focus on strengthening the capacity of partners, a commitment to collecting and using data, and the leveraging of investments by other public or private organizations committed to the project. Any application outlining a partnership will require partner agency signature and may require a memorandum of understanding between agencies.

This notice also links to resources to help potential applicants learn more about HSD's investment priorities and standard application requirements. Each funding opportunity, when released, will provide additional detailed information specific to the funding opportunities in the table below.

In the event of budget additions through Mayoral or City Council budget appropriations, HSD may elect to modify existing contracts until such contracts require a new funding process, or HSD may develop a new funding opportunity to expend the additional funds. 2022 Farm to Table Support Services

Anticipated

The 2022 Farm to Table Support Services Request for Proposals (RFP) will provide funding to increase food access by providing support services, including nutrition education and farm to family food bags, to Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities in preschool programs across Seattle. This RFP will also focus on supporting BIPOC farmers in King County.

2022 Youth and Young Adult Behavioral Health

The 2022 Youth and Young Adult Behavioral Health Request for Proposals (RFP) will fund community-based agencies to provide culturally appropriate behavioral health supports to youth and young adults from Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities.

2022 Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Survivor Services

Anticipated

The 2022 Gender-Based Violence (GBV) Victim Services RFP will fund a spectrum of services to address domestic violence, sexual assault, and commercial sexual exploitation (under the umbrella of “gender-based violence”). The goals are, to:

- Provide survivors with a spectrum of wraparound support to address immediate and on-going need of survivors and their families;
- Enhanced partnerships and collaboration among services and response systems
- Increase equity and access to services for all victims and survivors, with focused funds dedicated to serving BIPOC and marginalized populations
- Ensure a seamless response and referral service delivery system; and
- Embrace a client-centered, advocacy-first, approach

2022 Domestic Violence Intervention Project (DVIP) Services

Anticipated

The 2022 DVIP Request for Qualification (RFQ) will fund a minimum of 0.4 FTE or batterer intervention therapist to be a partner in the City of Seattle Domestic Violence Intervention Project (DVIP); an implementation project of the City with community-based and other system partners.

Funded partners will provide assessment and implement therapeutic interventions, and participate in monthly DVIP Planning, Multi-Disciplinary Team, as well as other elements of the DVIP Project.
