	Program Area	Question	Answer	
1	Eligibility/ Application	If an agency is applying for multiple service areas, they will need to submit not only separate budgets, but also the responses for each of the service area narratives for which they are applying, right?	Yes. Submit one application with separate budgets for the respective service areas. In addition, answer all the core narrative questions and the questions in the respective service areas for which you are applying. Your page limits will differ based on the different service areas for which you are applying.	
2	Eligibility/ Application	Is an agency allowed to submit as an individual agency under one area, but as a collaboration in another area?	An agency is allowed to submit its own application for one or more service areas, and, within the same application, enlist partners in any of the service areas. The agency may also be listed as a partner on a separate application for any service area not in its own application. The agency should not be the lead agency in the second application.	
3	Contracts	What is the history of the program and how does it function?	The <u>Seattle Food Committee</u> (SFC) and <u>Meals Partnership Coalition</u> (MPC) are networks that represent a collective of food banks and meal programs and have decades of history in Seattle. Previously known as the emergency food system, these networks act as the social safety net for food security in the city. Both networks meet monthly to share resources and host trainings.	
4	Contracts	What is the historic number of pounds /servings that are distributed weekly through this program?	The 2022 monthly average pounds of food procured (excluding donated food) was 52,000 lbs. These include fresh and frozen produce, fresh and frozen protein, milk and dairy products, grains and shelf stable food. Criteria for Eligibility (pg. 3, Guidelines).</i></li> <li>Minimum requirements for membership are: (1) the agency is in good standing by attending membership meetings; and (2) the agency is located/provides meal/food bank services within the city of Seattle. Changes to membership in each network may take place from year to year.</li> </ul>
