The program is in response to the disproportionate<br/>prevalence of tobacco smoking among American Indian and Alaska<br/>Native people in Washington State (29.7% for Al/AN people compared<br/>to 14.5% of non-Hispanic white people). The program provides primary<br/>prevention through smoking cessation with secondary prevention<br/>through lung cancer screening. Future program work will expand<br/>community outreach, increase commercial tobacco cessation options,<br/>utilize a mobile cancer screening, and increase national presence and<br/>collaboration.</li> <li>The Indigenous Cancer Health Equity Initiative (ICHE-i) utilizes a<br/>consortium approach to build research capacity, increase patient<br/>advocacy, initiate workforce development, and hold a biennial Tribal<br/>Cancer Health Summit. ICHE-I is developing a 5-year strategic plan to<br/>guide the work that will be continuously informed by an Indigenous<br/>steering committee.</li> <li>Members expressed support for the approach that Fred Hutch has<br/>taken to build sustainable and impactful pathway for Tribes and Native</li> </ul> | 35 min |



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communities to engage in health equity efforts that span direct services to policy and systems changes. Members asked questions about youth vaping and youth tobacco cessation data. Members were also interested in learning about community resources that can support tobacco cessation among Native youth. Members encouraged partnership and community outreach in partnership with Tribes and urban Indian organizations to maximize reach.

#### **Tribal Opioid Response**

- Briefing from Lummi Nation Tribal Council and Youth Tribal Council representatives and staff on tribal, local, state, and federal policy responses to the fentanyl crisis that is disproportionately impacting American Indian and Alaska Native people.
- In recent years, Lummi Nation has declared a state of emergency in response to the fentanyl crisis with the intention of identifying barriers and gaps that hinder the ability to provide top-of-the-line and wraparound services and make policy and code changes to address the crisis. For many Tribal communities, fentanyl and opioids related death have deep intergenerational impacts that directly effect the current and future well-being of Tribal Nations and Tribal cultures. Tribes are increasingly declaring a state of emergency in their jurisdictions to mobile local response through streamline and expediated decisionmaking, procurement, and investments to address the far-reaching and intersectional impacts of opioid use (health, housing, child welfare, criminal legal systems, etc).

- Currently, the Washington State and federal government have not used executive powers address the fentanyl through a whole of government strategy. As a result, American Indian and Alaska Native people in Tribal and urban Native communities continue to be disproportionately impacted by the fentanyl crisis.
- Tulalip Tribes hosted a Tribal Opioid Summit in 2023, drawing hundreds of Tribal staff, electeds, and other government and community partners to discuss and strategize intergovernmental and cross-sector responses to addressing opioid use among Native communities.
- Tribal leaders continue to advocate for tribal, local, state and federal partners to declare a state of emergency to encourage better coordination and increase investments in opioid responses that will benefit all communities.
