Migrant and Asylum Seeker's Resource Guide: How to Navigate Services

Developed and Published in February 2024 (Resource Information May Have Changed Depending on the Date)

The purpose of this document is to provide general and accurate information to migrant families who have requested assistance from the City of Seattle specifically for the migrant families experiencing homelessness that have requested assistance in Seattle. This information has been compiled by the Seattle Office of Immigrant and Refugee Affairs (OIRA). OIRA is not a housing department, doesn't provide shelter services, nor does it serve as an immigration office that processes immigration cases or asylum cases. OIRA's mission is to improve the lives of Seattle's immigrant and refugee communities through policies and programs.

Important phone numbers:

- **911** call or text in an emergency. An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from the police, fire department or ambulance.
- 211 information and referral to local resources and services in the country such as housing assistance, help with financial needs, location of the nearest food bank and many other resources
- **866-427-4747** twenty-four-hour crisis line. Immediate help to individuals, families, and friends of people in emotional crisis.

Protect Yourself Against Scams

Below are tips and best practices for avoiding and protecting oneself from scams targeting migrants and asylum seekers, including common tactics to watch for.

- Avoid individuals who say they are from "the immigration" who contact you through social media accounts. US governmental officials will not contact you through your personal social media accounts.
- Avoid individuals who promise to "get you to the United States quickly" if you pay a large sum of money.
- Always keep your passport and other identity documents in your possession.
- Anyone who is forced or coerced, through fear or lies, to perform labor, services, or sexual acts, is a victim of human trafficking. If you have seen or experienced this type of abuse, please call the National Human Trafficking Hotline at 888-373-7888.
- The US government will not ask you to transfer money over the phone or through Western Union, MoneyGram, PayPal, Venmo, or gift cards as payment for immigration fees.
- Sometimes businesses and websites pretend to be immigration experts or say they have special connections to the government. They might also guarantee that you can get a visa, Green Card, or work permit faster if you pay a fee. Beware of these organizations or individuals.

• In many Latin American countries, the term "notario público" (Spanish for "notary public") means something different from what it means in the United States. In many Spanish-speaking nations, "notarios" are powerful attorneys with special legal credentials. In the United States, however, notary publics are people authorized by state governments to witness the signing of important documents and to administer oaths but are not necessarily authorized to provide legal services. A notario público is not authorized to provide you with any legal services related to immigration. Only an attorney or an accredited representative working for a Department of Justice (DOJ)-recognized organization can give you legal advice. Beware of individuals who pose as immigration attorneys such as unlicensed or disbarred attorneys.

Free Legal Services

- Venezuelan migrants who came into the US before July 31, 2023, might be eligible for Temporary Protective Status (TPS). Free TPS application preparation sessions take place at the Riverton United Methodist Church every Monday from 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm on a walk-in basis.

List of Immigration Attorneys Accepting New Clients (not free):

Here are different services you might need:

- TPS: temporary protective status
- U-visa: for certain victims of crimes
- T-visa: for victims of trafficking
- EAD: Employment Authorization Documents
- VAWA: for victims of battery or extreme cruelty committed by U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents
- Affirmative Asylum: application for those seeking asylum who are not currently in removal proceedings before the Immigration Court
- Special Immigrant Juvenile Status (SIJS): for unaccompanied children under the age of 21 who have been found dependent by a juvenile court due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment of one or both parents
- DACA: Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals. It delays the deportation of people without documentation who came to the U.S. as children

King County Homelessness Authority Resources

Coordinated Entry Eligibility: Coordinated Entry serves all people, includingsingle adults, young adults, couples, families, and veterans who are experiencing homelessness. Please contact a Regional Access Point if you are:

- Living and sleeping outside
- Sleeping in a place not meant for human habitation
- Staying in a shelter
- Fleeing/attempting to flee domestic violence
- Exiting an institution where you resided for up to 90 days and were in shelter or a place not meant for human habitation immediately prior to entering that institution.

List of Regional Access Points in King County

Regional Access Points (RAPs) are an entry point. These entry points are resource centers where households experiencing homelessness may begin the process of exploring their housing options. They provide entry and assessment for the Coordinated Entry System; there is no guarantee this assessment will lead to a housing resource. Individuals and families experiencing homelessness may call ahead to schedule an appointment. To schedule an appointment for a Housing Triage Tool, households must contact a Regional Access Point directly. Regional Access Points have limited walk-in hours available. See below each RAP will list the walk-in hours available for that location. Walk-ins are first come first served.
