• Use of Force Definitions

Summary

• OPA alleged that the named employee's (NE) baton push against a demonstrator may have constituted Type I force and was not properly documented.

Analysis

- The NE used a baton three times to push a demonstrator, telling the individual to "move back." On the third push, the demonstrator tripped over a hedge and fell. The demonstrator did not complain of injury from the fall; however, OPA investigated whether the third push constituted Type I force and not *de minimis* force.
- <u>SPD Policy 8.400-POL-1</u> requires officers to complete a Use of Force (UOF) Report for all force except *de minimis* force.
- The NE did not complete a UOF Report for the baton pushes. In a different UOF Report, the NE added that he and other officers used riot batons to push demonstrators on that date, and it was reported to a supervisor and labeled as *de minimis* force.
- OPA believes a baton push that causes someone to fall to the ground constitutes Type I force and should be reported as such.
- <u>SPD Policy 8.050</u> defines *de minimis* force as "Physical interaction meant to separate, guide, and/or control without the use of control techniques that are intended to or are reasonably likely to cause any pain or injury. Type I force is defined as: "Force that causes transitory pain or the complaint of transitory pain."

Recommendation(s)

- Expand the definition of Type I force to read as follows: "Force that causes transitory pain or the complaint of transitory pain *or is reasonably likely to do so under the circumstances.*"
- Consider whether to a less expansive definition of Type I force is warranted in the context of demonstrations, given the significant amount of low-level force used by officers to move crowds.
- Alternately, as recommended in a <u>previous MAR</u>, set force reporting standards and procedures in the demonstration context that do not unnecessarily burden officers and supervisors while ensuring that force is fully and transparently documented.
