Topic

• De Minimis Force on Restrained Persons

Summary

A named employee used *de minimis* force on a handcuffed person inside a holding room.

Analysis

- The named employee guided a handcuffed person to a bench by grabbing his shoulder, gripping his arm, and escorting him forward.
- SPD policy prohibits using force on restrained persons <u>except</u> where reasonable, necessary, and proportional to:
 - i. protect against physical injury,
 - ii. prevent escape, or
 - iii. guide subjects into or out of a vehicle.

Absent an exception, SPD policy does not explicitly allow *de minimis* force to separate, guide, and/or control restrained persons.¹

• SPD training provides that "Officers will use control tactics to properly move a suspect from one location to the other." It instructs officers to control a "compliant" suspect's elbow and wrist² and emphasizes the importance of maintaining "positive control" of a subject.³

• Like SPD, other jurisdictions, including Bellevue,⁴ New York City,⁵ Portland,⁶ and San Francisco,⁷ regulate using force on restrained persons. However, unlike SPD, their policies explicitly allow *de minimis* force to control restrained persons.

Recommendations

- SPD should modify Interim Policy 8.200-POL-2 by inserting the word "reportable" before referencing "use of force on restrained persons." This would clarify that objectively reasonable, necessary, and proportional *de minimis* force on restrained persons is permissible.
- Alternately, SPD could modify Interim Policy 8.200 by adding a new exception for *de minimis* force to separate, guide, and/or control a restrained individual.
