



- Interpretive opportunities & visual expressions of art that tell the story of the neighborhood's history in engaging ways












PROJECT SCOPE & GOALS



The Garfield Super Block Campus is comprised of Garfield High School and Garfield Park. Located at the heart of the Central Area this campus is the neighborhood's placemaking hub or "Little City Hall", known for its ethnic and racial diversity as well as a rich history of development for Cultural Arts and Heritage.

Legacy & Promise Promenade

A pathway integrating art and narratives reflecting the immense cultural diversity and rich history of the Central Areas' seven ethnic groups of founding people.

Garfield Park

Improvements within the park to strengthen the overall site use and provide amenities that serve the neighborhood's diverse community.









"Garfield High School has been and continues to be a significant contributor to the unique development, heritage and diverse cultural character and promise of the Central District."

The Garfield Campus is considered as the Cultural City Hub of the Central area. Various events and people have made history here from Homer Harris, who became the first black captain of a Big Ten Football team in 1937 to Reverand Dr. Martin Luther King Jr's visit to Garfield High School in 1961.































Proview Comments

Play area pockets may be too small and could prevent free play movements
Buffer between parking and play is more important than between play and fields
Artful fence needs to be compatible with ballfields (location and materiality)



Show recently installed bleachers Elevated boxes may be tripping hazards Look at multi-uses at tennis courts
Show recently installed bleachers
Maintain storage for grounds crew and ballfields

Prevent parking in planting strip on 25th More trees and planting on east slope Artful band through lawn and planting is problematic

Logs & boulders instead of nature play

Prefer ADA path to start at top of stairs Look at safety zones for slides, climbing & porch swings

Show recently installed bleachers

Need to maintain maintenance routes to Community Center, Generator & Fields Preserve existing tree canopy














Art Vision















































































































































RESTROOM & CULTURAL BUILDING

Existing structure:

- Gendered Restrooms
- Women's restroom requires a ramp and faces the street
- Men's restroom faces gathering space
- · Concessions is single purpose and not used
- Current location creates dead space around it.
- Dark, unwelcoming, unsafe feeling.



















Updated Restoom:

- Improved visibility and lighting for safety






































COST ESTIMATE SUMMARY
