
Public Meeting 1

- Safety and Security
 Comments and concerns raised around homelessness in the park, improving lighting and views through the park, and making the park feel safer for everyone.
- Park Programming Considerations around a dog park, uses for the Shelter House, turning the adjacent street into a pedestrian only street, creating a larger plaza, bringing in food trucks and vendors.
- BIPOC / LGBTQIA+ How do we center the needs of these communities and their concerns? Would a specific focus on the BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ community exclude concerns of residents living near the park who may not identify similarly?
- Health and Human Services
 How will currently available services in the park be continued, or expanded to meet the growing needs of the Capitol Hill community, particularly to support those experiencing homelessness. Can the Shelter House support these services?
- CHOP / CHAZ
 Three types of uses were developed in the park through the CHOP/CHAZ process: the community garden, the conversation corner, and several community-based public art installations. How can these programs be treated and should they find a permanent home in the park?
- Operations and Maintenance With the current COVID pandemic restrictions, and the ongoing protests and activities from the CHOP/CHAZ process, how will the park be reopened, and how will existing amenities be continued and maintained?







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









Pre-COVID, how often did you generally visit the park?




When you go to Cal Anderson Park, what are the ages of the people you visit with?









Random sampling of responses


- "This is an integral community park and should be kept clean and highly functioning especially for people living within walking distance (this includes people experiencing homelessness). It should also be safe for small children so without a safe injection space there should be no injections happening. The spot where the garden has popped up is an excellent use of a neglected/underused part of the park. The playfields are some of the only ones in central Seattle and should be retained. More public art is never a bad thing"
- "This is a park, not a social action site. It should remain as it was originally designed for the peaceful enjoyment of the residents of the neighborhood, just like all of the other publicly funds parks in Seattle. Just because Cal Anderson Park had the bad luck to be located next to a police station that was the target of protests and violent attacks, is no reason to change it's historic purpose of being a place for the outdoor enjoyment of the neighborhood."
- "I go to Cal Anderson almost daily. The biggest issue has ALWAYS been off-leash dogs. I'm happy my homeless neighbors have a place to relax and i love enjoying the park with them but off-leash dogs and their owners who think they own the park are a consistent issue and they don't pick up their poop. More art, more gardens, more community care and get the dogs on leashes. I'm a dog walker, its not that hard"
- "CHOP/CHAZ is how the space should be. Serving the people. Nourishing then. Educating and
 entertainment. There was more programming than parks can ever facilitate. Let the people have
 the space back. Don't co-opt the art and movement to fit your department programing needs."
- "I view this park first and foremost for recreation. It isn't big enough to properly showcase everything mentioned in this survey without the park becoming a cheap "EPCOT" of proposals."


Random sampling of responses

- "I hope that Cal Anderson can be a safer space for houseless folks. I know that folks use that space to rest and find safe space. I think it would be great if folks trained in Harm Reduction and deescalation can work in the park and support the community members finding refuge there. I also want to keep in mind, that CHOP/CHAZ was an extension of the political uprising against police brutality. I have a couple questions. What is one way that you will take leadership from BIPOC folks in regards to the aforementioned art and gardening programming? How will you ensure that this park will continue to be a safe space from police and that BIPOC folks who use this park are not at greater risk of harm?"
- "I know it's hard to keep public areas clean. Is there any way homeless folks and the unemployed could be hired to clean and care our parks? Perhaps solve two problems at once?"
- "I'm all for the community art/garden spaces, but as a homeowner who lives just a couple blocks away.. PLEASE don't let this turn into another CHOP. That kind of space was incredibly disruptive to the small businesses that we all love and support in our neighborhood."
- "I am worried this this survey fails to reach its most critical audience, those in need of the resources three park has to offer, those who may not have access to internet or a computer, those without homes or struggling to hold on to their housing situations that may be without homes soon and do not have time to encounter or respond to this survey."
- "This is a hub of our community. Politicizing it permanently doesn't make it more inclusive. It makes it political and defines it around our differences, harms, and conflicts rather than around simply living in community with each other. I also think that the current protests erased the multifaceted history and heritage of the park and especially its history at the heart of LGBTQIAA equality."




The layout of Cal Anderson




These functions give rise to different types of activities and programming.

Programming - CHOP/CHAZ




During the CHOP/CHAZ process, the event space became a focal point for a variety of community gatherings, including the community gardens and public art.





The nearest transit station entrances are to the west along XXX street.

























Existing lighting in many areas needs to be updated and enhanced to support long-term use of the park and help make the park feel more welcome at night.





Community circles allow a way for people to congregate and share their ideas. This was an integral part of the CHOP/CHAZ community experience.









Wading Pool



- activation
- easily accessible
- good connection to event meadow
- only partial sun exposure
- somewhat hidden
- more extensive investment needed to support new use









Event Meadow



- open
- easily accessible
- central location
- good sun exposure
- may displace some events
- reduces some flexibility in the space








E Howell & 11th Entrance

Opportunity 3



- moderate sun exposure
- easily accessible
- open and visible
- interrupts open space
- within reservoir buffer
- more removed from central uses









Northeast Entrance



- activation of underutilized area
- easily accessible and mostly open
- more slopes
- less sun exposure
- less visible
- removed from central area of park









AIDS Memorial Pathway



- enhance existing memorial
- good sun exposure
- + easily accessible
- may not fit within memorial vision or historic character
- removed from central area of park
- interrupts the existing open space











E Howell & Nagle Place

- moderate sun exposure
- limited affect on other uses
- not easily accessible
- only partially visible
- greater investment for new uses
- topography complicates improvements








