What We Heard: First Public Survey

322 Survey Participants Comments Received

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Existing Features:

• Over 80% of respondents ranked the beach as extremely important Court, lawn and mature trees also ranked highly

New Racket Courts:

 Most respondents supported a new racket court, with pickleball options ranking highly • 25% of respondents ranked a new court as neutral, not important, or preferred no new court

Other Amenities:

 Many respondents wanted to keep or replace the swings and add new amenities (e.g. seating)

Comments Received:

 Desire to preserve Lowman Park's views, natural character, beach access and open space

What We Heard: Preferred Design Concept 531 survey respondents ranked each of these concepts in order of preference:

Concept 1 Full Size Multi-Sport Court

Concept 2A Medium Court + Swings

Concept 2B Medium Court + No Swings

Concept 3 Lawn + Amenities (No Court)

> None Do Not Make Any Changes to Park















Seattle Parks & Recreation Evaluation

Seattle Parks and Recreation (SPR) has reviewed the design concepts and community feedback.

SPR would support Concept 2A (Pickleball with Swings) or No New Construction.

Other factors that were included in this evaluation:

- Park size, context and unique characteristics
- Preservation of water views and safe beach access
- Goals of the SPR Strategic Plan to balance active and passive recreation
- Environmental impacts (e.g. grading & retaining walls)
- Local availability of tennis and other sports courts nearby
- Infrastructure and maintenance requirements
- Minimizing park impacts while maximizing recreational benefits (e.g. multi-use pickleball court designs)

In response to community feedback, SSCF and SPR worked to open up the existing courts at the SWAC.















Estimated Project Costs



Estimated Cost: \$450,000

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Note: estimate include costs for design, permitting & construction

At this time, no Seattle Parks & Recreation funding is available to pursue detailed design or construction of concept 2A.
