- 4. Meet the moment with inclusive engagement






What values drive our transportation vision?

20-year plan that tells the story of Seattle's shared transportation and public space vision with steps to achieve it.




Functional elements included in the STP

 - Program and project needs
 - Prioritization framework
 - Funding strategy



Intro to policy framework and performance measures



Create a clear and consistent policy framework





Policy framework definitions



Performance Measure

A clear and inspirational description of long-term change (**desired end state**) that provides a compelling, conceptual image; the dreaming (**aspirational**) piece of how we will change our community

A statement that defines the destination, **overall purpose**, or **ultimate aim**; a broad statement of desired long-term results

A statement of desired future conditions that is often **specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and time-specific** (SMART; performance measures may also be used)

A **method or plan** to achieve objectives, goals, or policies; often longer term than actions. Supported by **actions/tactics** that are actual steps taken to achieve a strategy; often short-term and concrete

A broad **category of comparison** or estimation. Supported and measured by **metrics/targets** as a standard or comparison; a quantifiable variable



Policy inventory, analysis, and creation

- •SDOT staff compiled policy statements from Seattle's existing comprehensive plan, modal plans, and strategic plans 250 total
- Identifying key policy gaps and conflicts
- Co-creating policy framework
