



NEW BATTERY BAN



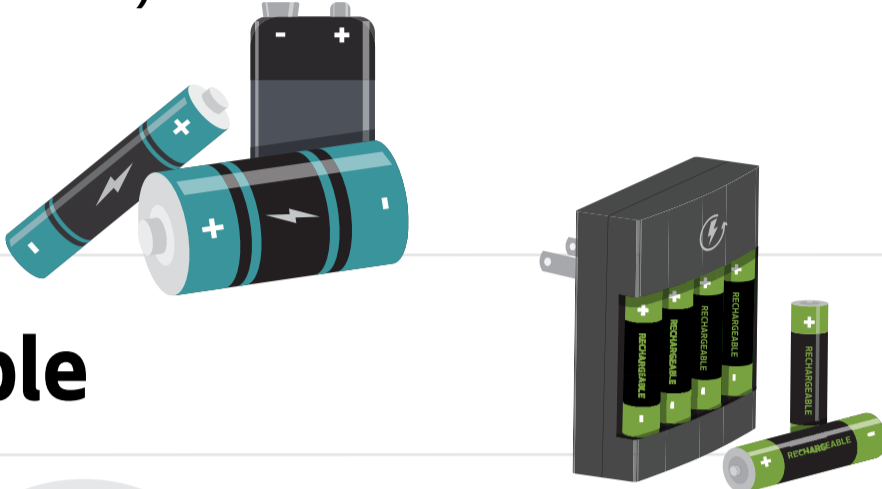
Batteries are NOT allowed in the garbage. They contain materials harmful to people, animals, and the environment.

Closed on July 4th, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

North Seattle: 1350 N 34th St, Seattle, WA 98103

South Seattle: 130 S Kenyon St, Seattle, WA 98108

Open 8 am - 5:30 pm everyday*

*except first Wednesday of the month 10 am to 5:30 pm

Special Item Pickup Fees apply.

Single-family homes: Submit a request online or call (206) 684-3000

Apartment & multifamily residents: Contact the building manager/owner.

Batteries: \$5 for up to 2 1-gallon plastic bags of household batteries.

Electronics: \$20 for as many items that fit in a 2'x2'x2' box.

Items larger than 2 ft: \$30
