- Currently in Council Phase. Council proposes:
 - Amendments changes to budget
 - Statements of Legislative Intent request reports from Executive
 - Provisos restrictions on funding



Context of the Proposed Budget (Overall)

Economic Conditions

- National economy showing continued strength, with the Fed beginning to lower interest rates
- Local economy continues to grow, but at a slower rate than experienced in recent years
- Growth in the technology sector, and the resulting boom in residential and commercial construction, has slowed

Budget Situation

- \$250+M projected General Fund deficit
- Revenue forecast projects modest growth forecast in overall General Fund resources
- Payroll Expense Tax revenue has out-paced original forecasts, but volatility will be a challenge going forward
- One-time, COVID-related Federal assistance expires in December
- New "outside" funding sources for City priorities (e.g., Inflation Reduction Act, Climate Commitment Act on November ballot I-2117)
- Transportation Levy renewal vote in November

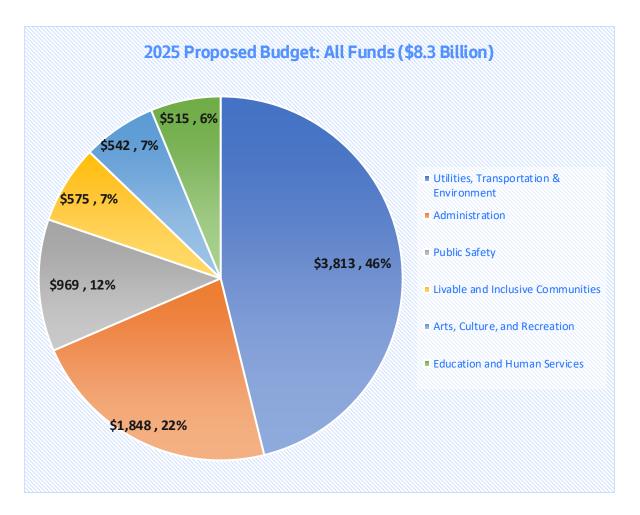

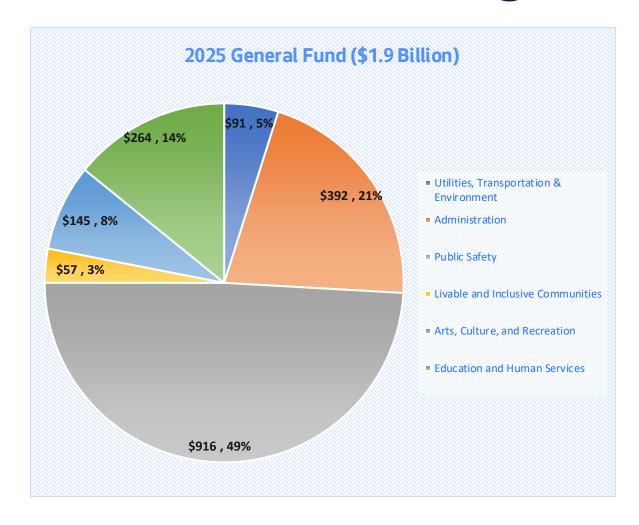


Total City Budget: \$8.3 Billion



- Utilities (SPU, City Light) and Transportation (SDOT) form nearly half the overall budget.
- Non-General Fund sources include:
 - Utility Funds
 - Transportation Fund
 - Payroll Expense Tax (Jumpstart)
 - Sweetened Beverage Tax Fund
 - Housing Fund
 - Levy Funds

General Fund Budget: \$1.9 Billion



The City's most flexible revenue source to spend

- 79% of GF revenue comes from:
 - Property Taxes
 - Sales Tax
 - Business & Occupation (B&O) Tax
 - Utility Taxes
 - Payroll Tax a portion transfers to GF (2021-2024)
- The rest comes from miscellaneous fees, traffic fines, etc. collected by the City

Urban Forestry Background



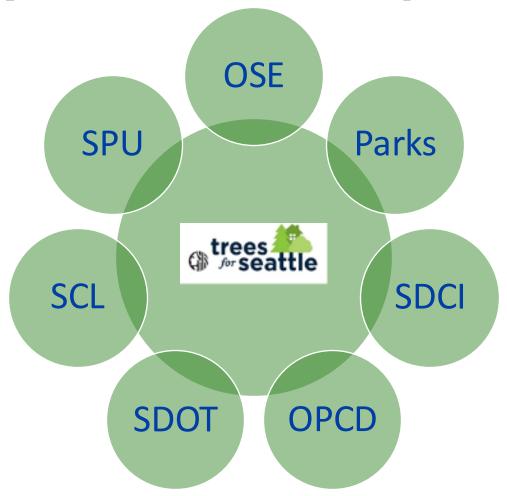
City-Wide Urban Forestry Strategies (UFMP)

- 1. **Environmental Justice:** Consider the needs of environmental justice priority communities in all urban forestry actions.
- 2. **Urban forest resilience:** Identify and implement management actions that increase the urban forest's resilience to potential impacts, including climate change.
- **3. Data-based management:** Understand the condition and complexity of the urban forest resource, how it was different in the past and how it may change in the future.
- **4. Cross-department coordination:** Coordinate communication, cooperation, and decisions within the City and with other agencies.
- **5. Community-City partnership:** Inspire, inform, and work with the community to help care for Seattle's urban forest.
- **6. Management of City trees:** Preserve, restore, and enhance the urban forest on City property and rights-of-way.
- **7. Incentives and regulations:** Provide support to the community via incentives and regulations for keeping, removing, replacing, and planting trees.

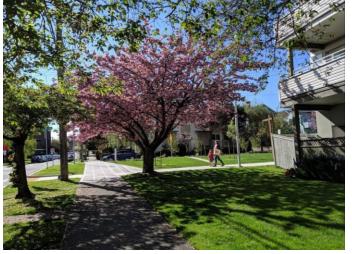

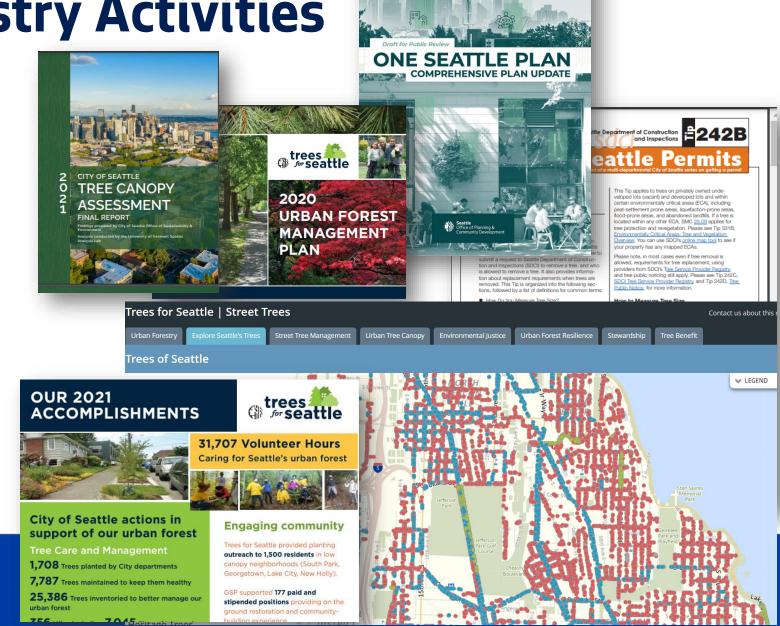

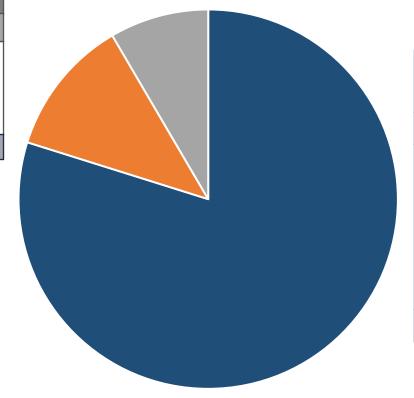

- New: One Seattle Tree Nursery (SPU)
- New: Climate and urban forestry data and reporting (OSE)
- No direct reductions to urban forestry activities

Other Incremental Budget Changes

No Direct Impacts to Urban Forestry

Department	Budget Change	Amount / FTE	Impact		
Parks	Reduce Park Land Acquisition Funding	(\$440,000)	30% reduction to SPR's New Park Acquisition Program, shifting these resources to the operating budget to support core department services previously funded by the General Fund. Retains \$1 million annual investment for acquisition.		
SCL	Enhance Response to Environmental Change	\$1,479,769	This add increases funding for vegetation management and addressing wildfire risk. (Part of a larger add including cybersecurity funding and positions.)
