## **Background:**

The Tenant Relocation Assistance Ordinance, Seattle Municipal Code 22.210 et seq., requires advance notice to all tenants who will be displaced by demolition, substantial rehabilitation, change of use, or removal of use restrictions from housing units, and for the payment of relocation assistance to eligible low-income tenant households. The Ordinance took effect on July 2, 1990.

Subsection A of SMC Section 22.210.130, “Relocation Assistance Payments,” provides as follows:

...The amount of relocation assistance shall be adjusted annually by the percentage amount of change in the housing component of the Consumer Price Index, as published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics. Such adjustments shall be published in a Director’s rule.

The amount of relocation assistance was last adjusted in 2024 by Director’s Rule 04-2024. This rule is necessary to comply with the requirement to adjust annually the amount of relocation assistance payment.

## **Methodology:**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics publishes two Consumer Price Indices, one for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and one for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W). The index for All Urban Consumers has been selected for the purpose of adjusting the amount of relocation assistance, because it covers a much broader segment of the population: (94%) In addition to wage earners and clerical workers, the CPI-U includes groups such as managerial, professional, and technical workers, self-employed and short-term workers, unemployed persons, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

In January 2018 the Bureau of Labor Statistics introduced a new geographic sample for the CPI. The area formerly known as Seattle-Bremerton-Tacoma Metropolitan Statistical Area was changed to Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue. The Housing Component of the CPI-U for the Seattle-Tacoma-Bellevue Metropolitan Statistical Area changed by 4.3% in 2024. Adjusting the amount of relocation assistance by 4.3% yields an amount of \$5,353.72. Rounding to the nearest dollar yields \$5,354.00.

**Rule:**

The amount of relocation assistance required by subsection A of SMC 22.210.130 shall be \$5,354.00. This amount shall apply to all Tenant Relocation License applications that are submitted on or after May 15, 2025.
