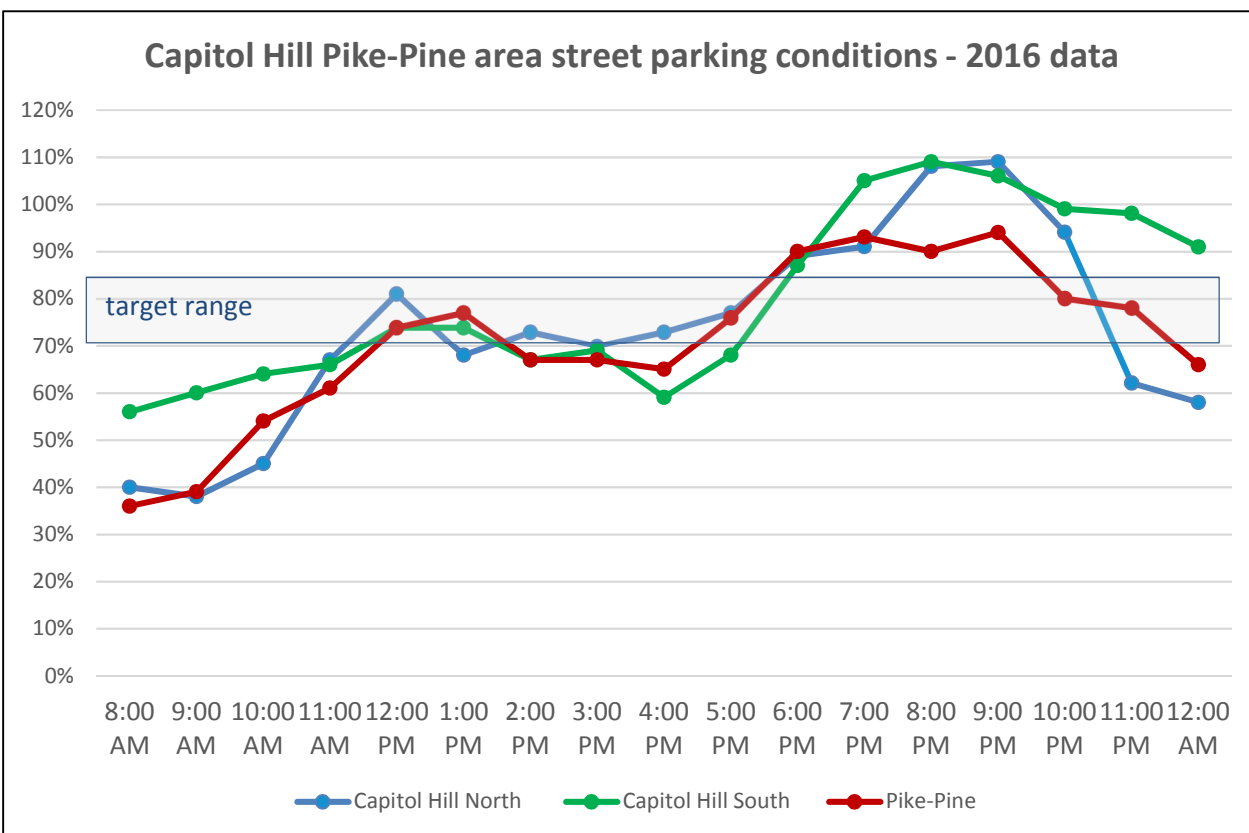
PROJECT OVERVIEW

As Seattle continues to grow with new residents and businesses, so too does the demand for access and parking in the City's busiest areas. Parking data collected in several Capitol Hill business corridors shows that demand for on-street parking during the late evening is far greater than the supply of available spaces.

To improve access for customers and visitors during these late-night hours, SDOT is planning to extend paid parking hours to end at 11 PM, compared to ending at 8 PM like they do today. This change to 11 PM is expected in fall 2017. This project is moving forward based on data from the 2016 Annual Paid Parking Study and from direction from the Mayor and City Council in the 2017 City Budget.

2016 PARKING DATA RESULTS

SDOT has conducted parking studies along Broadway and in Pike-Pine on a yearly basis since 2010. These two areas are some of the busiest in the City in terms of parking, transit, and multimodal use. Paid parking policy, adopted by the City Council and Mayor in 2010, calls for SDOT to adjust parking rates and hours of operation so that one to two spaces are open and available on each block throughout the day. In the Capitol Hill project area, streets with paid parking were almost 100% full between 8 PM and 11 PM. Paid parking is an effective tool to provide more reliable access for customers and visitors in areas like these where parking demand is very high late into the evening.



WHERE WILL PARKING HOURS BE EXTENDED?

SDOT plans to make these changes along the Pike-Pine and Broadway corridors. The map at right shows general neighborhood boundaries, but the changes will only be made on streets that have paid parking:

- Along Broadway and nearby side streets
- Pike, Pine, and nearby side streets

This project is not changing where paid parking is located and does not affect streets that do not have paid parking.

HOW WILL PARKING HOURS CHANGE?

We are looking at a variety of options that could be used to extend parking time limits, which we are taking feedback this spring.

Potential options include:

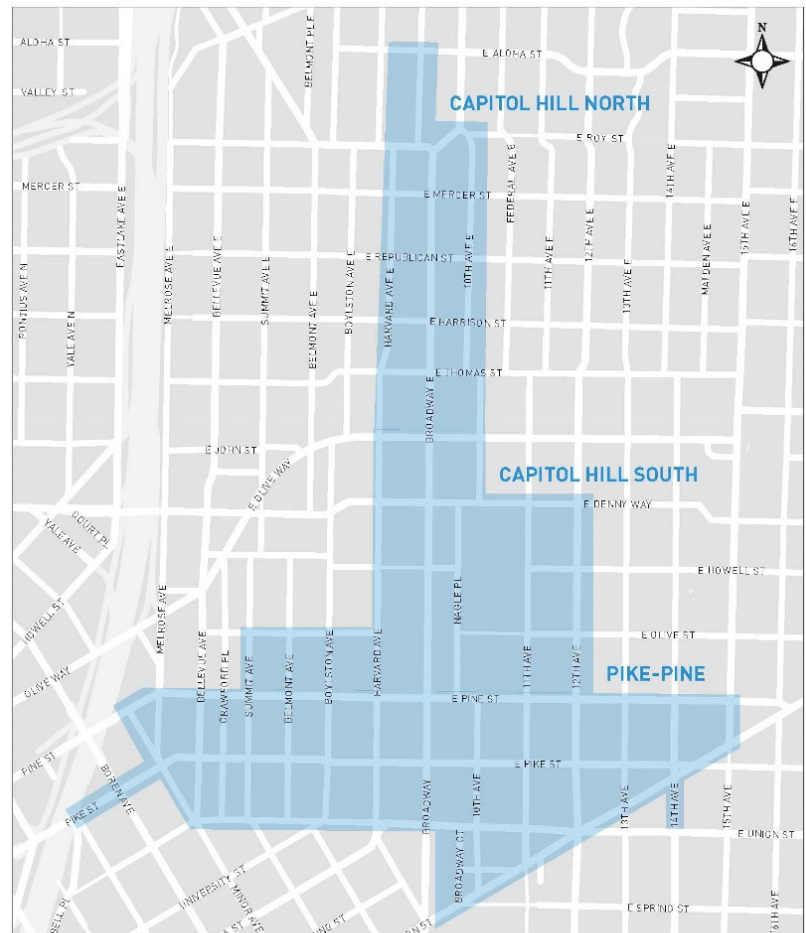
- Option 1: Two-hour parking limits before 5 PM and a 3-hour limit between 5 PM and 11 PM
- Option 2: Two-hour parking limits before 5 PM and then a flat rate charge after 5 PM until 11 PM
- Option 3: Two-hour parking limits before 5 PM and then a minimum 1-hour purchase between 5 PM and 11 PM, with a maximum of six-hour parking
